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Honorary Life Members

The Chapter Board is pleased to announce the awarding of two new Honorary Life Members of the Houston Chapter – Dr. Lewis Zailer and Dr. David Ashley White. Lew Zailer has been a fixture of our Chapter for many decades. He served as Chapter Dean in 1967-68, was awarded the Associate certification of the Guild, and assisted our Chapter in proctoring certification exams and other volunteer roles. He is presently retired but sustained a long career at several religious institutions in Houston: 18 years at First Baptist Church, 29 years at Tallowood Baptist Church, 10 years at Baptist Temple Church, and 35 years at Congregation Beth Yeshurun.

David Ashley White has served as the Director of and Professor of Composition and Music Theory at the University of Houston's Moores School of Music. His extensive secular and sacred compositions are widely performed, published, and recorded. He has received numerous commissions throughout his career, including from the Association of Anglican Musicians, the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Galveston/Houston, the Royal School of Church Music in America, and the 1988 and 2016 National Conventions of the American Guild of Organists. White is also widely regarded for his hymns, which may be found in the Episcopal Church's *The Hymnal 1982*, *The United Methodist Hymnal*, as well as many other sources. Beyond Bench and Podium: Employment Matters By Marsha Seale, Professional Concerns Chair

It's not all about the MUSIC! Yes, there's more ... Most AGO members are organists and choral directors. We have opportunities to make music in a variety of professional and religious settings. That said, there are non-musical employment-related aspects of our musical work or calling that sometimes need attention. The Professional Development Committee of each AGO chapter is responsible for providing information to members that will be helpful in seeking, securing, and maintaining positions as church or temple musicians.

Career Development and Support, sometimes called Professional Concerns, used to refer almost exclusively to investigations into unfair discipline and termination by employing religious institutions; the AGO Grievance Procedure prohibited Guild members from accepting employment at churches found to have treated members unfairly. In 2013, faced with members' concerns about the Grievance Procedure, the National Council voted to discontinue its use. As part of the 2013 restructuring of the AGO, the emphasis of Guild support for aggrieved members has shifted to a more proactive campaign. Local chapters and members are taught how to maintain a healthy workplace environment, in part through knowledge and application of the Code of Ethics, Code of Professional Standards, Discipline, Alternate Dispute Resolution, Mentor Program, Model Contract, Employment Review, Salary Guidelines, and other Professional Development options available to support AGO members. The Committee plans to encourage communication and the sharing of ideas among regional and local Professional Development officials, and eventually to provide a system for training local and regional officials in the skills needed for improving clergy-musician relations and for clergy-musician-lay leader conflict resolution. 
From Triomphe de l'Art Modal to The Embrace of Fire: Charles Tournemire's Gregorian Chant Legacy, Received and Refracted by Naji Hakim - Workshop by Dr. Crista Miller Saturday, January 24, 2015, 9-11 am (refreshments 8:30-9 am)

Miller lectured and performed portions of this material at two 2012 Tournemire conferences sponsored by the Church Music Association of America, Nova Southeastern University, and Duquesne University. Conference presenters, many of them pupils of the Ste. Clotilde tradition, aimed to study and re-illuminate Tournemire's massive work based on music for the Liturgical Year. Miller's doctoral document had identified Middle Eastern musical elements in Naji Hakim's works based on extensive study and contact with Hakim and Marie-Bernadette Dufourcet Hakim, both "grand-students" of Tournemire. Ste. Clotilde's legacy is also strong in Hakim and his homages to teacher Jean Langlais; Langlais's teacher, Charles Tournemire; and Tournemire's student, Olivier Messiaen.

Miller's comparison of Hakim's homage to Tournemire (Embrace of Fire) alongside the Sacred Heart Office of L'Orgue Mystique will illuminate how Tournemire's early experimentation with Hindu modes paved the way for future acceptance of exotic scales, and also how Tournemire used unusual registrations motivically, many reproducible on the Pasi Organ.
